Queen's University, home of Smith School of Business, has a rich academic tradition dating back to 1841. Located in Kingston, Ontario — one of Canada's most vibrant small cities — Queen's Smith Commerce is consistently ranked amongst Canada's best undergraduate business programs. Due to its strong reputation, Smith attracts top students from across Canada and around the world.

Centre for International Management (CIM)

The Centre for International Management at Smith School of Business coordinates the global activities within the school. This includes managing relationships with business school partners and overseeing our suite of exchange and double degree programs at both the undergraduate and graduate levels.

Smith maintains international exchange partnerships with over 135 business schools in over 40 regions and welcomes more than 500 international exchange students annually. Every year, well over 600 of our students travel to international destinations to participate in an international exchange or complete their global business projects.

Undergraduate Exchange Eligibility

Our undergraduate exchange program (*Commerce*) is offered as a fall, winter, or full-year exchange. It is strongly recommended that all applicants have successfully completed at least 6 foundation courses in Business and/or Economics at their home school. Students must be enrolled in an undergraduate program or in M1 of a Master's program in order to be admitted to the Commerce program.

Health Insurance

MANDATORY | University Health Insurance Plan (UHIP)

<u>UHIP</u> medical insurance offers coverage for basic services like emergency hospital visits and physical examinations. UHIP does not cover supplementary medical services, such as dental work or physiotherapy. International students must have primary health insurance provided by UHIP for the duration of their time in Canada. Fees are subject to change from year to year.

Students who hold a Canadian citizenship and are studying from another country may still be eligible for UHIP depending on period of stay. Please email SmithExchange@queensu.ca for more information.

OPTIONAL | Supplementary Medical Insurance

Supplementary insurance is available and covers services such as a portion of the cost of prescription medicine, physiotherapy, chiropractic care, eye examinations, dental work, vision care, travel coverage, and other services. Supplementary health plans are administered by our student government office: Alma Mater Society.

Visa and Study Permit

Entry Visa: Citizens of certain countries and territories will require either a <u>Visa or an Electronic Travel</u> <u>Authorization (eTA)</u> to visit Canada.

Study Permit: A study permit is required for anyone who wants to study in Canada for six months or more.







^{**} For student's beginning in the Fall term, if they choose to enroll into the Supplementary Medical Insurance, they must enroll in the insurance plan for two terms, for student's beginning in the Winter term, they are able to enroll for just one term.
